Wow! It's amazing that 2,500 years ago a renowned philosopher expressed similar opinions to those of many Baby Boomers today. So, I guess some things never change! As the EDM community's self-appointed curmudgeon, I'd like to expound on my concerns for today's "progressive government" and permissive society and my fears for their implications for our children and grandchildren.

Is "Progressive" Progress?

Government Sanctioned Drug Use

It's amazing how quickly this happened. We went from a "war" on drugs to the expunging of drug convictions and government sanctioned retail drug outlets owned by convicted criminals in the name of "equity." An Expanding Culture of Low Expectations

This is not merely a government issue but, more importantly, a societal issue.

The societies in many Asian cultures have extremely high expectations of their youth. That is a likely explanation for the high success rates for Asians in both education and business. (Staid institutions like Yale and Harvard actually discriminate against Asian students in their admissions process to keep their numbers down to create a more diverse student body.)

Here in the U.S., not so much. We have become a nation of excuses for poor results rather than a nation that rewards achievements for both adults and children. The convicted murderer is depicted in his high school graduation cap and gown and was probably hassled by the racist, evil police.

This is not to say that an exceptional young person cannot succeed in the low expectation environment, but the rest of youth are less likely to achieve their potential in a low expectation environment.
